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2010 HUMANITARIAN OF THE YEAR EXECUTIVE OVERVIEW



The Humanitarian of the Year award, presented annually by the American Red Cross of Greater Columbus, recognizes local people whose efforts and accomplishments have made our communities better places to live and work. Based on the Fundamental Principles of the World Red Cross Movement—humanity, impartiality, neutrality, independence, volunteer service, unity and universality—the award finds focus in the first of these principles—humanity.

On Tuesday, April 27, 2010, nearly 600 Columbus business and community leaders joined the American Red Cross of Greater Columbus at the Hyatt Regency to recognize Jay and Jeanie Schottenstein for their philanthropy and dedicated volunteerism, which have enormously impacted the well-being of people locally, nationally and internationally. Additionally, Jay and Jeanie have instilled the values of community service and philanthropy in their children to impact lives in countless ways for years to come.

As one of the most distinguished families in philanthropy, Jay and Jeanie are well-known for their generosity to numerous local, national and international projects. Concerned about the quality of life for all, Jay has a deep commitment to health and education issues while Jeanie's community involvement entails a strong commitment to issues relating to women's health, education and awareness of domestic violence.



Humanitarian of the Year also served to raise much-needed funds for our local Red Cross chapter. This annual luncheon, which has grossed more than \$2.8 million since its inception in 1997, raised more than \$260,000 this year to support the life-saving services and programs of the Red Cross in Franklin, Fayette, Madison and Pickaway Counties.

Because of the support of many generous corporate contributions, such as yours, the Red Cross was able to publicly honor outstanding individuals, who have demonstrated great leadership, volunteer service and openhandedness for the betterment of our community and those whose lives they touch.



While raising important funds for our Chapter, the event also became a vehicle for telling the Red Cross story behind the life-saving work of our organization in this community. Humanitarian "anchor" Angela Pace, Director of Community Affairs at WBNS 10TV, led a news broadcast themed program to illustrate the stories of Red Cross clients and volunteers, demonstrating the many ways in which your Red Cross Chapter saves and improves lives in central Ohio.

The Red Cross Report began with international news regarding the Haitian earthquake. From the anchor desk Angela tells the audience that the rebuilding in Haiti continues today after that devastating January 12th event. The earthquake and subsequent aftershocks killed approximately 220,000 people and left more than one million people instantly homeless.

Making his debut as a news correspondent, Michael Carroll, CEO of the American Red Cross of Greater Columbus, elaborates on how the American public is helping through the Red Cross. The American people, many facing hard times themselves, have provided the American Red Cross with over \$400 million to aid in the relief and recovery efforts in Haiti. With the Haitian Red Cross immediately activating their disaster response plan, the American Red Cross and twenty-nine other Red Cross/Red Crescent societies from around the world immediately joined the United nations in rushing disaster experts and supplies to the incapacitated country.

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Continuing the international affairs segment, the audience was introduced to a heartwarming story of a local Somali woman, separated from her mother and daughter since fleeing her country 15 years ago. It was the American Red Cross of Greater Columbus that played a direct role in reuniting Ishla with her family. Conflict and disaster leave millions of people around the globe in urgent need of humanitarian assistance every year and through the strength of the global Red Cross and Red Crescent network and the assistance of local tracing volunteers around the world, families reconnect.



The next topic on *WARC* is an example of how the Red Cross Service to Military Families program helped bring home a military son stationed in New York to help care for his ill father who lives here in central Ohio. Patricia Caudill took the stage and along with her son Josh, who participated via Skype, shared the Red Cross roll in getting Josh home quickly. The program is designed to keep families connected by relaying emergency messages and providing military authorities the information they need in order to grant emergency leave so that families can confront and resolve emergencies together. The Caudill family used this resource a second time when Josh's grandmother passed away.

After lunch *WARC* focused on local news... this story comes from Jean Patrick whose home caught fire recently. One ordinary day turned into the

Patrick's nightmare. The fire started in Jeanie's garage and quickly spread to the rest of her home. The advice from the 911 operator was "get out of the house"! While the Patricks had personal resources to support their long road to recovery, for Jeanie, seeing the Red Cross truck coming down the road was a reassuring sight. Many families that suffer a house fire lack insurance and already face daily financial challenges. Red Cross assistance and case management services prevent many from becoming homeless. Make a commitment to Be Red Cross Ready and ensure that your family knows how to "get out" quickly.

The program ended with a powerful message from Andy Cecil of Cecil & Geiser, a law firm located in downtown Columbus. While in a board meeting for a trial lawyer organization, a friend and colleague collapsed on the floor and no one in the room knew what to do. Across the hall were folks being trained in CPR who did. Though Andy's friend suffered a massive heart

attack and did not survive, it was a total wake-up call for Andy. Andy has pledged that all employees of Cecil & Geiser would be trained by the Red Cross in CPR, use of an AED and first aid. Recertification will be an annual event at the law firm. Don't wait until after a crisis occurs to contact the Red Cross ... call today to get certified.

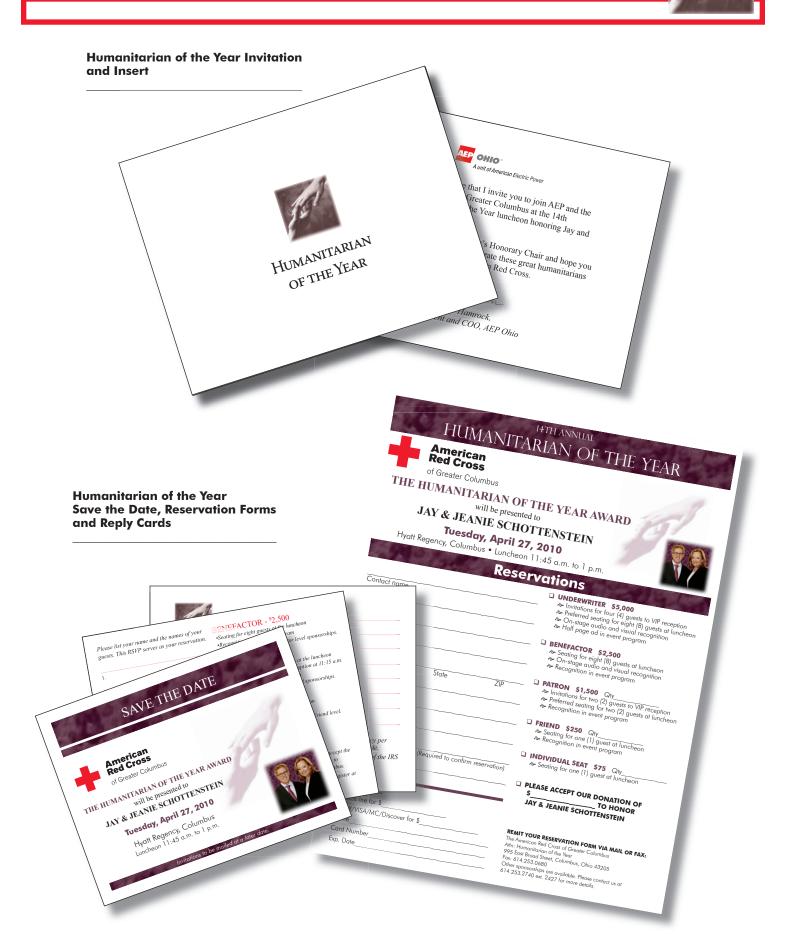

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SUPPORTING THE CAUSE

The Humanitarian of the Year event is one fundraising program providing financial support for the programs and services of the American Red Cross of Greater Columbus.

- Health & Safety Training, including community and workplace training in CPR and First Aid, the use of Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs), Aquatics Safety, AIDS and Communicable Disease Transmission Education, Family Care Giving and Emergency Preparedness.
- **Community Transportation** to vital appointments, such as dialysis or chemotherapy, for elderly or persons with disabilities.
- **Emergency Communication** to help connect military men and women with their families in times of emergencies.
